CAMPFIRE RECIPE

Campfire Breakfast Burritos



Ingredients

2 lb. yellow potatoes (cut into 1" pieces)

3 Tbsp. olive oil

1/4 tsp. salt

12 eggs

1/4 cup milk

1/2 tsp. salt & 1/4 tsp. pepper

1 lb. ground sausage

1 green bell pepper (small, diced)

1 red bell pepper (small, diced)

1 small onion (diced)

2 cups shredded cheddar (or Monterrey Jack cheese)

Salt and pepper

12 tortillas

Directions

Cook potatoes with half of the olive oil, eggs with milk, and sausage in a large skillet, one after another

Pour remainder of olive oil in skillet and add red and green bell peppers and onion. Cook until tender.

Add the eggs, potatoes and sausage and continue to cook until well blended and hot through. About 10 minutes.

Salt and pepper to taste

Divide mixture evenly between the 12 tortillas, then do the same with the cheese

Foldup on end of the tortilla, then roll tightly. Place each burrito in a piece of aluminum foil and cover securely.

Place on grill or on hot rock in the fire





Up and Coming Single-Footing Trainer: Featuring *Alyssa Kennedy* of Hawesville, Kentucky

When I asked for a story about how she got started training or one of her most fulfilling training narratives, she wrote:

I got a phone call one evening from a really good friend of ours who really helped me get all my paperwork in line for my Standardbreds. He called to tell me about a group of horses who belonged to a friend of his who had passed away. He said they were needing homes and getting ready to be shipped for slaughter, so we decided to take the gamble and hop in the truck and head to Ohio.

We brought home four horses, and, in the mix, was this beautiful bay roan standardbred mare, Ala Pam. Her feet were so long that they curled upward. The horses had been kept in a massive barn and fed free choice alfalfa: they were beautiful. But they had not been touched since yearlings, and she was now 10 years old, shy of humans and didn't want to be messed with. But after a few weeks of handling, we finally gained the trust of the herd, and they came around.

We were able to trim their feet, and I even started to saddle break them. We re-homed three right away, but I spent a little more time with Pam. After I gained her trust, had her saddle broke, and had spent a lot of time training her, I decided it was time to re-home her as well. She turned out to be a really great mare, one I was proud of, especially considering that, when she came to us. she had been completely unhandled. I am happy we had the chance to save her. It was a very cool experience to have with a horse. She is now raising foals for Devin White in Louisiana.

VET'S CORNER

Summer sores in horses are a common condition that can affect horses of all ages and breeds across many geographic areas.

Summer sores, also called granular dermatitis, are lesions on a horse's skin that are caused by a microscopic parasitic worm (Habronema).

These painful looking lesions develop when a house fly deposits the worm's larvae within existing wounds on the skin, causing an inflammatory reaction. These areas appear as red raised lesions or open sores that don't heal on their own. They can sometimes be filled with yellow or white granular material created by the inflammation from the larvae.

Three species of Habronema worm are seen most in summer sore lesions: H. muscae H. microstoma and H. megastoma. All three worms are carried by flies. These infections typically occur when flies are more active, such as in the spring or summer.

Signs of summer sores in horses include: red, raised lesions similar to proud flesh (excessive granulation tissue) that don't heal; yellow or white granular material within the lesions; blood tinged or clear discharge from the lesion, and itchiness.


Summer sores in horses occur when the normal life cycle of the intestinal worm is broken. Instead of depositing the larvae near the horse's mouth where the horse ingests them, flies land near already open wounds or moist areas on the horse's body and deposit the Habronema there instead.

Wounds are not the right environment for Habronema larvae to develop to adults, so they will stay in the wound and cause local inflammation and swelling.

The mainstay of treatment for summer sores in horses is deworming with products such as ivermectin or moxidectin, and may require multiple treatments. These deworming agents can also be used topically (applied directly on the lesion) to maximize the dose impact on the larvae within the wound.



What To Do For Dry Hooves

During the summer, we see a rise in dry hooves due to moisture imbalance resulting from environmental conditions that are too hot and dry.

As the hoof becomes drier it loses elasticity and begins to weaken. When hooves become excessively dry they lose integrity. Once the hoof integrity begins to deteriorate, several other issues can develop.

Low moisture balance in the hooves can lead to loss of elasticity and a brittle hoof that is more likely to crack, chip, split and crumble. The compromised hoof quality can impede your horse's ability to work, train, or hold a shoe.

A horse's external hoof wall acts as a barrier against the germ-laden environment. Hoof cracks and chips create a passage way for bacteria to enter the hoof capsule and to gain access to the nutrient-rich middle hoof wall. This may lead to additional defects and a collapsing hoof horn. Microbial invasions also promote hoof wall separations and the development of White Line Disease.

Maintaining moisture balance is the main objective when attempting to prevent overly dry hooves. The hoof tissue contains phospholipids that control moisture balance within the hoof that can become overwhelmed in environments that are excessively wet or dry. The best way to maintain moisture balance within the hoof is to assist the phospholipids in doing their job. You can do that three ways:

1) Restrict your horse's exposure to excess moisture.

2) Use a Proven Hoof Conditioner Regularly

3) Use a phospholipid supplement that contains fatty acids and phospholipids.


Owned by Craig Stripling of Nacogdoches, Texas, and sired by George Forman's Rowdy Rawhide's Gator, this bay colt is the result of a "30 year mixing, matching, blending, breeding program. ... Based on past or prior premium representatives of nicely going and performing comfortable road and saddling horses, [this colt] will hopefully assure a natural four beat gaiting genetic trait," says Mr. Stripling.

"While there's perhaps no guaranteed master mixing manufacturing formula, it is thought that the 500 year evolved Spanish gaiting gene, by virtue of the herein almost 1/5th inclusion, will assure a non-lateral smooth travel ride in a couple of years to come, when Roller is under saddle!

"Maybe even at a clip that kicks up the dust! We hope! ... This leggy lad should demonstrate a locked in steady strolling Single-Foot scenario."

According to Mr. Stripling, the colt's approximate breed alo-

cation is as follows: 18.75% Paso Fino, 69% Standardbred, 12.25% evolved mixed (possibly Saddlebred and Tennessee Walker strains). As he describes: "a Spanglo American evolved racking horse colt".

The Cajun Classic is a South West Louisiana gaited horse show run by the Bellard and LeMoine family, and caters to the Single-Footing horses. This show was founded to give the horsemen in the southern region a place to come showcase their horses.

The Cajun Classic horse show is very much a family oriented event; we pride ourselves in creating an environment where you can bring your whole family to sit back and relax. At our show we have predominantly keg shod classes, with a few open shod classes. The designated venue where we host the event is West Cal arena in Sulphur, Louisiana, a covered dirt arena with stalls and wash racks located on the outside. The Cal is conveniently located right off of interstate 10, surrounding by multiple hotels, fast food restaurants, and dine-in restaurants.

The judges of the show are both long time trainers Cornelius Belton and Durrel Eglin. Mr. Belton is a long time Louisiana trainer who has competed, made, and sold plenty of horses all over the world; he has owned notable horses such as DrummerBoy, Pitty Pat, and Trouble Maker.
