Campfire Recipe

Beef Stew Packs

Ingredients

2 pounds beef chuck roast, fat trimmed

5 or 6 potatoes, peeled and diced

6 carrots, peeled and sliced in rounds

8 ounces fresh mushrooms, sliced

2/3 cup chopped onion

2 celery sticks, sliced

2 cans golden Mushroom Soup

Chopped fresh parsley

Salt and pepper to taste


Hot pepper sauce, optional

6 ice cubes


Directions

Grease six large double thicknesses of foil with cooking spray. Cut the roast into small cubes. Divide roast, potatoes, carrots, mushrooms, onion and celery among foil pieces. Spoon about 1/3 can of soup over each serving. Sprinkle with parsley, salt and pepper; add a few drops of hot pepper sauce if desired. Place one ice cube on each serving and wrap foil around food to make 6 tent packs.

Set foil packs on grate in the grill or medium coals over the fire. Cook 50-60 minutes or until meat and veggies are tender rotating packs several times during cooking.

VET'S CORNER



Digestive Problems in Horses

Unlike many other animals with hooves, horses only have one stomach, but they do have longer intestines for optimal nutrient absorption. This means that the food that they eat must be easily digested, yet still chock full of the right nutrients. Because of this, horses are prone to developing digestive problems including colic, parasites, and gastric ulcers.

Gastric Ulcers are generally small erosions in the lining of the stomach which are painful and can affect the appetite, appearance, demeanor and riding experience of your horse.

What are the clinical signs? Painful areas in the lining of the stomach causing appetite reduction or inconsistent appetite. He may prefer hard feed to hay because long fiber can traumatize the ulcers and cause pain.

Constant pain in the stomach can cause low grumbling colic, especially after eating

The coat can become dull and the horse's temperament can change, or he can become subdued and tetchy

Ridden exercise can cause the stomach acid to splash onto the ulcers causing pain which can be misinterpreted as a lameness, naughtiness or back pain

Minimizing stress offers the best assurance your horse will not get ulcers. Make sure your horse is turned out as much as possible, that his exercise regime is measured and consistent and that any changes to management or exercise are phased in gradually. Feeding a high proportion of the diet as forage also ensures the acid in the stomach is buffered in contrast with excessive quantities of hard feed which is more likely to create high acid levels and accordingly, damage to the stomach lining.

Colic', the most common digestive problem, is the name given to most abdominal pain in horses. Ranging from a mild stomach ache to a displacement or twist in the intestine requiring lifesaving surgery, colic is many horse owner's biggest concern.

Clinical signs of colic include pawing or scraping the ground, turning to look at the abdomen (flank watching), restlessness or getting up and down frequently, frequent attempts to urinate, rolling, increased pulse and high temperature.

A consistent feeding schedule, a lot of forage and plenty of water, help reduce the risk of colic.



ANVIL TALK



A hoof abscess is a localized bacterial infection in the sensitive structure of the hoof, the way the hoof gets rid of dead cells from a trauma. Simply, it is a pimple in the hoof. There are many causes of an abscess including the introduction of a foreign body like a pebble, shoeing nails hitting too close to the laminae allowing bacteria to enter, trauma to the sensitive layers of the hoof, a reaction to bruising, laminitis, or going from dry to wet weather conditions

Whatever the reason for the development of the abscess, it is important to know that since the hoof cannot expand, the increased pressure of the pus collecting within the hoof capsule, the body's reaction to the infection, causes what can be significant pain to the horse.

As each day passes, the pus finds and takes the path of least resistance to relieve the pressure and will usually work its way up the hoof wall, normally breaking out at the coronary band, although the abscess can also break through the bulbs on the heel.

Symptoms can range from no symptoms to complete lameness and can include swelling in the lower leg, heat ifelt on the exterior of the hoof wall, increased pulse in the hoof, and attempts to walk on the toe

If your horse is shod, you will need to pull the shoe then, with hoof pincers, try to pinpoint the sorest area. If you can find the black line (which is what the infected area looks like), then it may be possible to actually create a hole in the sole or the white line area to allow the infection to escape. If the infection is located and a hole is created, a lot of times a blackish or brownish, nasty-smelling fluid will ooze out. Once the hole has been created, you will need to keep the hoof clean, soak once a day in Epsom salt and water, pack it with an Epsom salt poultice, and bandage for several days to a week, depending on how long it takes for the lameness to disappear.

As the lameness decreases, soaking and packing the hoof can decrease in frequency.




























Foggy Mountain Breakdown



Can you tell what is going on here?

1) This hoof is healthy because the extensor process is even with the hairline. It is also almost ground parallel.

2) This foot shows Laminitis (also known as founder), a serious and painful condition that can result in lameness if not treated effectively and within a suitable period of time. Contrary to common belief, this particular type of medical condition is not due to ill conditions but is seen among many horses irrespective of the amount of care being provided.


