Campfire Recipe



Ingredients

- 4 Large Pieces of Foil
- 4 Teaspoons Brown Sugar
- 1 Cup of Baked Beans
- 8 Slices of Bacon
- 1 Large Onion

Four Hamburger or Venison **Patties**

2 Pieces of Corn on The Cob Broken in Half

Butter

Seasoned Salt and Pepper

Directions

For each foil pack, layer one large onion slice, four bacon strip halves, about a quarter cup of baked beans, and one teaspoon of brown sugar. Set a hamburger or venison burger on top and sprinkle with seasoned salt. Place half of a piece of corn on the cob on the meat. Top with butter and pepper to taste. Wrap the foil around the food to make a tent pack. Cook until meat is done and corn is tendered.

To grill: Cook over medium heat 25 to 30 minutes.


At the campfire: Set foil packages on medium coals and cook 25 to 30 minutes, rotating twice.

The History of Veterinary Medicine

The field of veterinary medicine is believed to have begun around 9000 BC in Middle Eastern countries. Sheepherders had a crude understanding of medical skills which were used to treat their dogs and other animals.

A Vedic document, circa 1500 BC, and a Kahun Papyrus from Egypt, circa 1900 BC, are likely the first written accounts of veterinary medicine. One of the documents states that India's first Buddhist king, Asoka, defined two kinds of medicine: one for humans and one for animals.

The Kahun Papyrus deals in part with the topic of animal gynecology. A fragment of a papyrus dated approximately1850 BC, indicated that Egyptians were familiar with the anatomy of animals and could recognize early warning signs of certain diseases in dogs, birds, fish and cattle, and used specific treatments to deal with them. The Romans, Greeks, Babylonians, Hindus, Arabs and Hebrews also practiced animal medicine

Early attempts to regulate and organize the treatment of animals were mainly focused on horses because of their economic importance to society. During the Middle Ages, farriers combined their trade of horseshoeing with general horse doctoring. In 1356 the Lord Mayor of London persuaded all farriers within a seven mile radius of the city to form a fellowship to improve and regulate how they treated horses. The fellowship led to the creation in 1674 of the Worshipful Company of Farriers.

The first veterinary school was founded in Lyon, France in 1761 and focused on studying the anatomy and diseases of sheep, horses and cattle in an effort to combat cattle deaths from a plague in France.

In 1791, the London Veterinary College was established The wellbeing and health of horses was their initial focus because of the use of horses in the Army

The first veterinary school established in the United States was the Veterinary College of Philadelphia in 1852. In 1883, the University of Pennsylvania established the oldest accredited veterinary school still in operation. The American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) was established in 1863.





Kerckhaert's SSP Versus 3/8

This past January, several SHOBA members met at Fleetwood Johnson's Lakeview Farm for a casual meeting to discuss SHOBA's involvement in the upcoming show season. Added to the agenda was the approval or rejection of the Kerckhaert SSP shoe since the question had arisen at one of the last shows of the previous season. Some of those present were asked to attend because of their close association with a show venue: Junior Shupe with the Wise County Show, Carlos Stanley with the CPM Trail Riders (Memorial Show), Sherry Hilton with the SCRHA (Burley Fest), and Joshua Burchfield with Germantown and the RHBAA shows. SHOBA class judges Trent Ferguson and Paul Cook were also asked to attend since this would affect how they judged the 2018 SHOBA classes. Other SHOBA members turned up because of their interest in showing or in SHOBA registration regulations.

The primary focus of the SSP discussion centered on the use of the shoe in performance registration and the show ring. To that end, several shoes were brought to be weighed, measured and compared. At that time, the unofficial weighing and measuring of the SSP was found to be approximately 1/8th of an inch wider than the homemade forged $3/8 \times 3/4$ and .4 of an ounce heavier in the largest sizes compared. The measurements of smaller sizes were comparatively less.

Controversy arose and misinformation was released. So, we decided to do a definitive study and research of the issue in order to clear up any misunderstanding. All information found in the following article was gathered through official sources including manufacturers, retailers, professional farriers unassociated with SHOBA, and online distributors; this includes the measurements and weights. Many hours went into the accumulation of the data.



An example of the horse shoe keg that the shoes of the 1700s & 1800s were shipped in. They were 24" tall by 12" diameter and weighed about 100 pounds. This practice came into use when manufacturers were able to produce a poured shoe much quicker and at a lower cost than they could be hand forged. Hence the name "keg shoe". Today manufactured shoes are shipped in cardboard boxes but still referred to as a keg shoe.

SSP Unclipped

The original unclipped style, most popular on the hunter jumper circuit. A broad choice of steel sizes, made in front and hind patterns - left and right, makes this an extremely versatile series.

[The SSP is] popular on the hunter/jumper and dressage circuits."* According to several sources, those disciplines prefer a wider base shoe so as to protect the hoof more effectively.

While most manufactured shoes in the past were poured shoes, the metal heated until it melted then poured into molds and cooled, current day shoe manufacturers machine turn the metal for a quicker, more inexpensive mass production process.

Very few shoes on the market now are hand forged. Yet, many horse owners and farriers still hand forge shoes and these are popularly called "handmade". The material used to produce the shoe is bar stock which is heated and shaped by hammer on anvil into a 3/8" x 3/4" shoe. Since they are handmade and each hand is different, so is the shoe. No two are exactly alike. In this study three different brands of the 3/8 x 3/4 shoes were weighed and measured: the hand forged MW Shoes by Walling Manufacturing sold by Tennessee Farrier Supply, the machined 3/8 x 3/4 shoe made by Iron Craft Manufacturing sold by the Breeder's Farrier Supply in Lexington, Kentucky, and the machined 9mm x 18mm-22mm** Kerckhaert Dura Plain, part of the American Family Series produced in Belgium for the Royal Kerckhaert Horseshoe Company. The Dura Plain is considerably cheaper than the other brands costing from \$4.20 to \$5.75 per shoe. Since Kerckhaert now owns Diamond Shoes, I did not include them in this study. * OlympiaFarrierSupply.com ** 9mm x 19mm is nearly the same a

x 3/4: What's the Difference?

As you can see in the table below, the heaviest shoe by far is the machined $3/8 \times 3/4$ made by Iron Craft Manufacturing weighing 16.6 ounces in a size 2. Second is the hand forged shoe by Walling Manufacturing weighing 16 ounces, third is the SSP at 15.2 ounces and last, the Kerckhaert Dura Plain at 14.6 ounces. The size 2 SSP is approximately a $2/5 \times 9/10$, slightly thicker and wider than the $3/8 \times 3/4$. In the smaller sizes it is $3/10 \times 9/10$, thinner but wider than a $3/8 \times 3/4$.

If the issue is weight, then based on the results of this study, the SSP is acceptable and so is the Dura Plain, already allowed because it is rated as a 3/8 x 3/4 shoe by the manufacturer. The question arises, though, should the SSP be allowed because they are, after all, slightly wider than 3/4 inches. According to SHOBA owner Ben Cantrell "If that small amount of extra width protects the horse's hoof on the trail, the strip or in the show ring, it's worth it."

At present, The Rocky Mountain Horse Association and the Kentucky Mountain Saddle Horse Association both allow the SSP in the show ring and both associations consider their registered horses to be naturally gaiting and allow no ac-

tion devises.




