# Campfire Recipe

## Cherry Coconut Crisp



### Ingredients

1/2 Cup quick cooking oats  
1/3 Cup raw shredded coconut  
1/4 Cup chopped pecans  
3 Tbsp sugar  
1/2 Tsp cinnamon  
1 1/2 Tbsp coconut oil  
1 1/2 Tbsp maple syrup  
1 (12 Oz.) pkg frozen cherries  
1 Tbsp lemon juice  
1 Tbsp cornstarch  
4 slices canned pineapple  
Chocolate chip optional  
4 pieces of sprayed foil

### Directions

Combine oats, coconut, pecans, 2 Tbsp. sugar, and cinnamon. Stir in oil and syrup and set aside.

Combine cherries, remaining 1 Tbsp. sugar, lemon juice and cornstarch; toss well.

Place a slice of pineapple on each of the foil pieces. Spoon cherry mixture evenly over the pineapple then top with the oat mixture. Sprinkle with a few chocolate chips. Wrap foil in a tent shape.

Place foil packs on the grill or on a coal in the campfire for 12 to 15 minutes.

# White Line Disease

Many common horse health problems originate from the hooves.

This is because the hooves are the most used part of a horse's body. Proper hoof care and hygiene must be maintained for the hooves so that they are able to remain healthy and tolerate the wear and tear that they are subjected to on a daily basis. A common problem of the hooves in horses is white line disease.

This condition affects the area where the foot meets the hoof. If it goes undetected it can lead to separation of the hoof wall and the laminae, which is why treatment of white line disease in horses is so important. Rotation of the coffin bone can also result. The disease first appears as a white line which then starts to deteriorate and eat away at the horse's hoof.

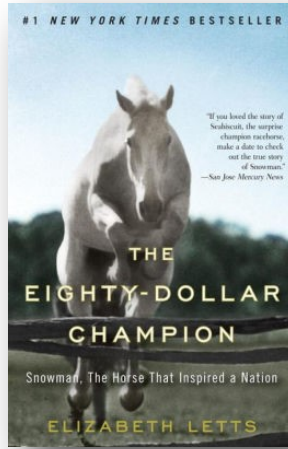
It is known to result in a significant amount of pain and if left untreated can cause the horse to become lame. There are plenty of white line disease in horses treatment options and it's important to get a quick diagnosis and check done by your vet.

The causes of white line disease in horses are a combination of fungi and bacteria that usually inhabit pastures or barns. These organisms thrive in non-oxygen surroundings such as a cracked hoof. Therefore horses with cracks in their hooves are more likely to develop white line disease. Preventive measures are a lot more effective than any white line disease treatment option and can save your horse from a great deal of pain.

There are certain early symptoms of white line disease in horses. These include bulging of the hoof and tenderness of the soles. When the hoof is tapped using a hammer, there may also be a hollow noise. Infestation can also occur when the horse loses a shoe or part of the hoof. In order to determine how to treat white line disease in horses, a proper diagnosis is first necessary. An x-ray of the hoof may be performed to determine the extent of the damage. A farrier may also have to be consulted so that the horse can be shod therapeutically to provide support to the affected hoof.

Certain medications may also have to be applied to the hooves. It is also necessary to trim the hooves up to a point where are not affected by the disease any more. One of the most important steps in treating white line disease in horses is to ensure that they are kept in a dry, warm and secure area where there will not be exposure to bacteria.

## Try Beeswax To Combat Fungi And Bacteria

Many farriers across North America have told American Farriers Journal that this has been one of the worst years for fungal and bacterial related problems in the hoof wall. To help keep the invading microbes at bay, one farrier uses an all-natural solution — beeswax.

"People talk about how it has natural anti-fungal and anti-microbial properties, so why can't we use beeswax?" asks Shane Westman, farrier at the University of California, Davis.

*(A blowtorch can be used to soften the wax. Once soft, a section matching the hoof problem can be cut from the wax block. Roll the warmed wax into something that resembles a worm.)*

A research team at the University of Pisa led by Filippo Fratini, affirms the anti-fungal and anti-microbial benefits of beeswax in a paper titled, "Beeswax: A Minireview Of Its Antimicrobial Activity And Its Application In Medicine," which was published in the July 2016 issue of Asian Pacific Journal of Tropical Medicine.

"I put it anywhere that's questionable," Westman says. "Anything that I can't get wholly clean, I'll roll the worm in copper sulfate to avoid causing an anaerobic environment."

After placing it in the void, he runs the butane torch over the worm to melt it and seal it in place (Figure 4, above).

"When you pull it out after the shoeing cycle, it will be stained," Westman explains. "When you glue on a shoe, the adhesive will work around it and sticks really well. It keeps the area treated very nicely."

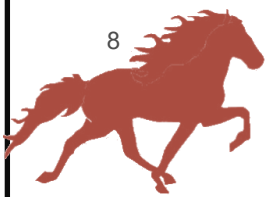

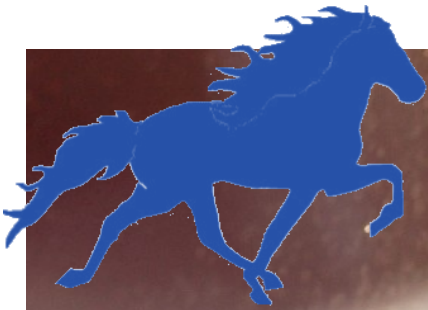
